




18. Corinth and return... (Acts 18:5 to 18:22)





After these things **Paul departed from Athens** and went to **Corinth**.

And he found a certain Jew named **Aquila**, who had recently come from Italy with his wife **Priscilla** ...

So, because he was of the same trade, he stayed with them and worked; for by occupation they were **tentmakers**.

And he reasoned in the synagogue **every Sabbath**, seeking to persuaded both Jews and Greeks.

(Acts 18:1-4)











But now that **Timothy** has come to us from you, and brought us **good news** of your faith and love...
(1 Thessalonians 3:6)



When Silas and Timothy arrived from Macedonia, Paul was occupied with the word, testifying to the Jews that the Jesus was the Christ.

Paul worked less and preached more...

(Acts 18:5)



And you Philippians yourselves know that in the beginning of the gospel, when I left Macedonia, no church entered into partnership with me in giving and receiving, except you only.

(Philippians 4:15)

Whoever hears the sound of the trumpet and does not take warning... his blood shall be on his own head.

(Ezekiel 33:4)



And when [the Jews] **opposed** and **reviled** him, he shook out his garments and said to them,

"Your blood be on your own heads! I am innocent.
From now on I will go to the Gentiles."

And he left there and went to the house of a man named **Titius Justus**, a worshiper of God, A Gentile believer whose house was next door to the synagogue.

(Acts 18:6-7)

I baptised ... **Crispus** and **Gaius** ... the household of **Stephanas**. (1 Corinthians 1:14-16) The household of **Stephanas** ... the firstfruits of Achaia... (1 Corinthians 16:15) **Gaius**, my host and of the whole church, greets you. (Romans 16:23)



Is it **Gaius**Titius Justus?

Crispus, the ruler of the synagogue,
believed in the Lord,
together with his entire household.
And many of the Corinthians hearing Paul
believed and were baptised.

(Acts 18:8)

And such were some of you!

neither the sex nor men who ARE WASHED; ilers, nor swindlers will inherit the kingdom of Goa.

(See 1 Corinthians 6:9-11)



We preach **Christ crucified**, to the Jews a stumbling block and to the Greeks **foolishness**... (1 Corinthians 1:23)



And I, brethren, when I came to you, did not come with excellence of speech or of wisdom declaring to you the testimony of God.

For I determined not to know anything among you except Jesus Christ and Him crucified.

(1 Corinthians 2:1-2)

Question:
How was
Paul feeling?



I was with you in **weakness**, in **fear**, and in much **trembling**. (1 Corinthians 2:3)



And the Lord said to Paul one night in a vision,

"Do not be afraid, but go on speaking and do not be silent, for I am with you, and no one will attack you to harm you, for I have many people in this city."

I am with you always...

And he stayed a year and six months, teaching the word of God among them.

(Acts 18:9-11)



Lucius Junius Gallio Annaeanus (c. 5 BC – c. 65 AD), a Roman senator and brother of the famous writer Seneca.

But when **Gallio** was proconsul of Achaia, the Jews made a united attack on Paul and brought him before the tribunal, saying,

"This man is persuading people to worship God contrary to the law."

(Acts 18:12-13)

51-52 AD

Not Jewish – another (illegal) religion!

But when **Paul** was about to open his mouth,

Gallio said to the Jews, "If it were a matter of wrongdoing or vicious crime, O Jews, I would have reason to accept your complaint.

But since it is a matter of questions about words and names and your own law, see to it yourselves.

I refuse to be a judge of these things."

The Greeks or the Jews?

And he drove them from the tribunal.

And they all seized **Sosthenes**, the ruler of the synagogue, and beat him in front of the tribunal.

But Gallio paid no attention to any of this.

Sosthenes our brother... (1 Corinthians 1:1)

(Acts 18:14-17)

After this, Paul stayed many days longer and then took leave of the brethren and set sail for Syria, and with him **Priscilla** and **Aquila**.


At **Cenchreae** he had cut his hair, for he was under a vow.


(Acts 18:18-21)

(Romans 16:1)


...the vow of a Nazirite, to separate himself to the LORD (Numbers 6:2)






And they came to **Ephesus**, and he left them there, but he himself went into the synagogue and reasoned with the Jews.

When they asked him to stay for a longer period, he declined. But on taking leave of them he said, "I will return to you if God wills," and he set sail from Ephesus. (Acts 18:18-21)









Paul's THIRD journey begins...


After he had spent some time there, he departed and went over the region of Galatia and Phrygia in order, strengthening all the disciples.


(Acts 18:23)
