The gospel of Matthew - how is it different?

The audience

Matthew is primarily addressed to Jewish readers.

So, is it still relevant for us?

The use of the Old Testament

There are more Old Testament quotations in Matthew than in the other three gospels combined.

The references to the Kingdom

Only Matthew uses the phrase "the Kingdom of Heaven" and he refers to the Kingdom more than other gospel writers.

His emphasis is to present the Lord Jesus as its King.

The teaching passages

Matthew includes more teaching passages than Mark and Luke.

The teaching in John's gospel is distinctly different from the other three gospels.



The setting...


And great crowds followed Him from Galilee and the Decapolis, and from Jerusalem and Judea, and from beyond the Jordan.






The scribes and Pharisees
